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# **INTRODUCTION**

This report presents a 2018 Census labour market profile of the Whakatāne, Kawerau and Ōpōtiki districts, and the Eastern Bay overall, including historical trends and with a particular focus on young people and Māori. The report was compiled by Toi EDA from Statistics New Zealand online data.





# Access to basic household amenities




- \* Similar to national average level of access to basic household amenities
- \* Ōpōtiki households less likely to have tap water that is safe to drink (93%)
- \* Dwellings not owned by the occupier were less likely to have a refrigerator or safe tap water



# Access to telecommunication systems



- \* Less likely than national average to have access to the Internet or a mobile phone
- \* Substantial increase in access to Internet or mobile phone since 2006
- \* Around 2% of households have no access to telecommunication systems




#### **POPULATION**

This section provides a brief overview of 2018 and historical Census counts of the resident population.


As at Census night on Tuesday 6 March 2018, the Eastern Bay had a usually resident population of 52,122 people. More than one-fifth (23%) of all residents were under the age of 15. An increasing proportion of residents are aged 65 and over and exiting the labour force.

The population has seen a resurgence in recent years. All three territorial authorities initally declined between 2006 and 2013 and then rebounded by a greater number by 2018.

# Usually resident population trends 2006-2018



The Eastern Bay population is becoming more culturally diverse. In 2018, 59% of Eastern Bay residents classified themselves European, 52% Māori, 3% Pacific Peoples and 3% Asian.



The number of Māori residents increased from 22,134 in 2013 to 27,039 in 2018, which is around half (52%) of the Eastern Bay population. This proportion was highest in Ōpōtiki (64%) and Kawerau (62%).

# **LABOUR FORCE STATUS**

The Eastern Bay had higher rates of unemployment than the regional and national average, as well as higher rates of people not in the labour force (e.g. retired, looking after children at home, students, or permanently unable to work).



Between 2013 and 2018, the percentage of Eastern Bay residents aged 15 years and over who were unemployed decreased from 8.0% to 6.6%. Excluding people not in the labour force, the unemployment rate for Eastern Bay overall was 12.6% in 2013 and 10.2% in 2018. The 2018 unemployment rate was 8.7% in Whakatāne, 17.8% in Kawerau and 11.2% in Ōpōtiki.


# Unemployment rate, 2006-2018






# Work and labour force status, 2006-2018










As at March 2018, the Eastern Bay unemployment rate for 15-29 year-olds was higher at 13.0% compared to 6.5% for the older 30-64 age group.


# Work and labour force status by age group, Eastern Bay 2018



The March 2018 Eastern Bay unemployment rate for Māori (10.7%) and Pacific Peoples (10.9%) was higher than the unemployment rate for the European (4.0%) and Asian (4.4%) ethnic groups.

# **INDUSTRY**

The largest employing industry division in the Eastern Bay was agriculture, forestry and fishing (15.4% of employment) followed by manufacturing (10.7%), education and training (10.3%) and health care and social assistance (10.2%).




Employment in all of the Eastern Bay's major industries has increased since 2006, including a 45% increase in health care and social assistance employment, 23% increase in the agriculture, forestry and fishing industry, and 23% increase in the education and training sector.

Each territorial authority has a different industry profile, with manufacturing more prevalent in Kawerau and higher levels of agriculture, forestry and fishing employment in Ōpōtiki.

In terms of specific industry subdivisions, the biggest employers of young people aged 15-29 years in the Eastern Bay are agriculture, food and beverage services, and food retailing.



In terms of major industry sectors employing 15-29 year olds in the Eastern Bay, employment amongst this age group grew fastest between 2006 and 2018 in the primary sector (e.g. agriculture), with strong growth also in secondary industries (e.g. manufacturing), health care and social assistance, and other services.

# Employment by industry sector for age group 15-29 years, Eastern Bay 2006-2018



Employment for Māori in the Eastern Bay was highest in the agriculture, forestry and fishing industry (1,653), followed by education and training (1,347), manufacturing (1,068) and health care and social assistance (1,044).



#### **OCCUPATION**

Compared to New Zealand overall, the Eastern Bay had a higher proportion of people in labouring occupations and a lower proportion in professional occupations. Each district has a distinct occupation profile, with a higher percentage of professional occupations in Whakatāne and more labouring occupations in Ōpōtiki and to a lesser extent Kawerau. There has been relatively little change in overall occupational profile since 2006 in the Eastern Bay.


#### Employment by occupation, 2018

A high percentage of young people aged 15-19 were employed as labourers (35%) and sales workers (24%). While labouring remained a prevalent occupation for older cohorts, the occupational profile for people aged 25-29 included higher percentage of managers (15%), professionals (15%) and technicians and trades workers (14%).


# Employment by occupation for young people, Eastern Bay 2018



# **INCOME**


In 2018, median personal income for the population aged 15 and over was \$20,600 in Kawerau, \$22,400 in Ōpōtiki and \$26,300 in Whakatāne compared to national average of \$31,800.

# Median personal income for population aged 15 and over, 2018




Between 2013 and 2018, the median personal income in Whakatāne grew by around 3% compared to 8% in Ōpōtiki, 10% in Kawerau and 12% nationally. Over the same period, the Consumers Price Index (cost of living) increased by approximately 6%.

# Median personal income trend 2013-2018




As wages have increased over time, a greater percentage of the Eastern Bay workforce are earning higher wages and salaries. Between 2006 and 2018, the percentage of Eastern Bay residents aged 15 and over earning \$70,000 or more doubled from 9.9% to 19.1%.

#### Personal income level 2006-2018, Eastern Bay




Median personal income is lowest in the younger age groups. For 15-29 year olds in 2018, the median income in Whakatāne was \$13,800, Ōpōtiki \$13,700 and Kawerau \$11,800.

# Median personal income by ethnic group, 2018




# STUDY PARTICIPATION

A lower percentage of Eastern Bay residents aged 15 years and over were participating in full-time or part-time study in 2018 compared to the national average.


Between 2006 and 2018, study participation declined as a percentage of the total population aged 15 and over, however this was partly driven by the impact of population ageing.

# Study participation of population aged 15 and over, 2018




Looking specifically at the younger age groups, study participation increased slightly for Eastern Bay residents aged 15-19 between 2006 and 2018 but declined substantially for young people aged 20-24. According to Census data, the total number of Eastern Bay residents aged 20-24 who were participating in full-time or part-time study fell from 336 in 2006 to 261 in 2018, despite a 44% increase in the number of residents falling into this age group.

Study participation by Māori and Pacific Islands young people was generally lower than other ethnic groups, with 5.3% of Pacific and 8.3% of Māori aged 20-24 in the Eastern Bay participating in full-time or part-time study in 2018.



# **HIGHEST QUALIFICATION**


A higher percentage of Eastern Bay residents aged 15 years and over had no qualification in 2018 compared to the national average. Ōpōtiki (22.6%) and Kawerau (20.8%) in particular were home to higher than the national average (11.6%) percentage of adults with no qualification.






Between 2006 and 2018, there was a steady increase in the percentage of population aged 15 and over who had at least a secondary schools qualification. This includes substantial increases in the percentage of people with a level 5-6 diploma and above within each territorial authority in the Eastern Bay, reflecting a national trend toward higher qualifications.

# At least a secondary school qualification, Eastern Bay 2006-2018




# Level 5-6 diploma or above, Eastern Bay 2006-2018


# Highest qualification by ethnic group, Eastern Bay 2018



# **TRAVEL TO WORK**

A higher percentage of people in Ōpōtiki (18%) and Whakatāne (16%) work from home compared to the national average (12%). Workers in Kawerau are more disposed to travelling by vehicle (83%). Very few people use public transport to travel to work in the Eastern Bay.

Young people aged 15-19 years in the Eastern Bay were more likely than other age groups to walk or jog (12%), ride a bicycle (5%) or catch public transport (1%) to work.



#### TRAVEL TO EDUCATION

A higher percentage of people (all age groups) in Whakatāne compared to other areas travel to education by vehicle (49%), predominantly as a passenger. Travelling to education by school bus is most prevalent in Ōpōtiki (29%) and walking or jogging to education is most prevalent in Kawerau (27%).

Young people aged 15-19 years in the Eastern Bay were more likely than other age groups to walk or jog (28%), ride a bicycle (2%) or catch public transport (2%) to education.



# **ACCESS TO BASIC HOUSEHOLD AMENITIES**


Households in the Eastern Bay have similar to the national average level of access to basic amenities. In 2018, 92% of Eastern Bay households were reported to have a refrigerator, 95% had tap water that was safe to drink, 98% had cooking facilities and 98% had an electricity supply.

Within the Eastern Bay, households in Ōpōtiki were least likely to report having tap water that was safe to drink (93%).





Within the Eastern Bay in 2018, the households least likely to have access to basic amenities were those not owned by the occupiers, of which only 93% reported having a refrigerator and 95% had tap water that was safe to drink.



# **ACCESS TO TELECOMMUNICATION SYSTEMS**


Households in the Eastern Bay in 2018 were less likely than the national average to have access to the Internet (78%) or a mobile phone (89%). Around 2% of Eastern Bay households reported having no access to telecommunication systems.

# Access to telecommunication systems, 2018




Mirroring the national trend, since 2006 there has been a substantial rise in household access to cellphones and the Internet in contrast to falling numbers of landline phones.

Households in Ōpōtiki were less likely to have access to the Internet (72%) or a mobile phone (82%) and more likely to report having no access to telecommunication systems (3%).
